PRIMETIME

I'm not sure where the name came from, but Primetime is a mixed bag of folk who come together on a Friday afternoon to enjoy playing boccia and kurling at the village hall. The afternoon is inclusive thanks to leader Joe McKechnie from Hambleton District Council, who offers seated games sessions adapted for both able and more challenged participants. Those attending describe it as, "an entertaining afternoon", a time of "jollity and fun" and a chance to "compete on a level playing field".



Boccia is indoor bowling with softer balls, with competition compounded by Joe's ability to devise ever more new challenges. Kurling uses wheeled discs, moved by hand or pusher sticks to reach a target. The two games are separated by a friendly social time over refreshments.

Primetime meets from 1-3pm at the village hall on Fridays, with a suggested donation of £3 to cover hall hire, but anyone can go along for a free taster visit. Just pop in to see what is going on, or maybe bring a friend who would benefit from a couple of hours in cheerful company.

Stillington Village Hall – Annual General Meeting

The property known as the Village Hall is held on trust for the benefit of all residents of Stillington and the surrounding area, serving the community with space for meetings such as: Parish Council, Women's Institute, Gardening Club, Village Archive, Ladies Lunch, indoor sports, theatre and music events, plus fundraising to support the upkeep of the building. It is also hired out to individuals and groups for approved use.

The Village Hall is a registered charity number 1076571 and is run by a management committee of up to 12 elected Trustees. New members may be co-opted at any time, but Trustees are elected at the AGM, which will be held this year on Wednesday 25th May at 7.30pm

The AGM will be a short meeting to report on what has been happening at the hall in the past year, how the property has been maintained and improved, and how our finances have fared as we have returned to more normal operation following Covid restrictions. It would be really good to see new faces at the AGM and possibly new volunteers for the committee. If you have not been over the doorstep before, this would be an opportunity to look round and get a feel for the place. Trustees would also be delighted to hear any ideas or proposals you might have for future activities / events / entertainment.

Your Village Defibrillator is kept in the Church Porch Available 24/7. A second Defibrillator is at the Sports and Social Club near the Squash Court entrance. No code needed. *Remember: Call an Ambulance, start CPR, get the Defibrillator - it will tell you what to do*

worked in some of the best seafood restaurants around. He will be assisted by **Rob Hallas**, who is Sous Chef at the Grantham Arms, Boroughbridge and former Head Chef at the Punch Bowl, Martin-cum-Grafton.

Weather Report -April 2022 Rainfall

Despite two long-ish dry spells, the total rainfall in March came to 41.5mm, almost exactly the long-term average figure. April is usually the driest month of the year. Up to the 16th, this year we had received 21.5mm.

Temperature

The warm spell in the middle of March continued into the fourth week, with a maximum temperature of 21.2 C, a record for the month. The solar panels reflected this, with some 360kWh generated, similar to the figure in 2020.

Following a cool start, April has also given us some warm days with a high of 21.4 C on the 16th. Nights have often been quite mild, so a sudden -1.2 c on the might of 9th/10th was a bit of a shock. **MT**

Stillington and Farlington WI

On Wednesday 13th April we welcomed Liz Cole to tell us something about Holy Wells and springs in our area. In pre-Christian times these were thought of as conduits

to the gods and so developed an aura of mysticism and magic.

When Christianity arrived the Church realised that it would be advantageous to incorporate the water sources into the "new" faith.

Many of these water sources contained iron or other minerals (deficiency conditions like anaemia were not recognised) and people often found that drinking the water from these wells/springs made them feel better.

Hallikeld Well in Stillington - Halli meaning holy and Keld meaning water, is marked on the 1852 O/S map. It is now arable land with no sign of the spring.

Blind Keld in Sutton- on- the -Forest used to flood fields so has probably been piped away as there is no sign of it now. Water from here was supposed to cure eye problems.

Many wells became associated with saints. After the Reformation holy wells became less important until some were re-invented as Spas, one of which was Hovingham Spa. The newly built railway station was re-named Hovingham Spa in1896 in an attempt to promote the spa resort.

At our May meeting there will be no speaker as we will be discussing WI resolutions. Our June meeting will be on the 8th when we will hear from Adam Raffell of the Trussel Trust telling us about the local food banks, who can use them and their importance especially in these difficult times.

We meet on the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00pm in Stillington Village Hall. We welcome all visitors (£4 a head including refreshments), hope to see you soon.

Countryside Notes May 2022

Easter Monday, 8.55pm. How things have grown in the garden and on the farm, with blossoms appearing on Apple and Pear trees and billowing clouds of White Blackthorn that will bear the Sloes beloved of the Sloe Gin makers, if the frost keeps away and lets the blossom set. I am afraid the Plum trees flowered a bit early, and the frost will have spoiled the fruiting capacity of many trees. I tried to protect our small Apricot tree, but with not a lot of success. It flowered well but most flowers have dropped off having failed to develop due to the frost.

We do underestimate the power of the sun as it works with nature. I was surprised to see that so many dandelions have broken through the tarmac on the path up to the Church near the York Road junction. How can such a plant push through a path like that? It would have made a man sweat to break such tarmac with a pickaxe. We have had more butterflies enjoying the sun lately; they need the sun to warm their blood enough to become active and fly. We were pleased to see Holly Blues flitting along the tall Holly hedge near our house. They will be laying eggs on the small white holly flowers for their first brood, who will then lay their eggs on Ivy flowers in the backend of the year. The sun will have set the sap running profusely within the trees, which will make leaves and flowers develop. We often overlook the flowering of our trees: some flower before the leaves; some come in the leaf bud; others wait for the leaves to grow. Have a look at the Horse Chestnut candles when they are out and you will see that some flowers have a red patch and others a yellow patch, which you will find are male and female flowers growing side by side.

Have you noticed a small white flower growing really close to the road verge on the York Road and all the roads of our land? This squat plant is Scurvigrass, a coastal maritime plant that has expanded its territory because of the winter salting of our roads and has used an opportunity to spread. Its leaves are fleshy and round and no way like grass leaves.

There is so much to see at this special time of the year, perhaps we should make a bigger attempt at looking and enjoying life all around us, with its masses of colour, its structure and smells. This, all too good to miss and "inflation" has not made it prohibitive to our mercenary minds, it remains priceless and free to all who will look and see. **R & M**

Peace on Earth Goodwill to all... thoughts from Revd. Steve, May 2022.

'Peace on Earth Goodwill to all,' this is usually associated with Christmas and the birth of Jesus, yet I find myself reaching for this phrase in this the season of Easter (Easter Day to Pentecost (05 June)). Why you may wonder do I am mixing my seasons; the answer is fairly simple, allow me to explain. At Christmas we look forward with eager anticipation for all that we hope Christmas brings - hope, joy, peace. Easter Day, the day we commemorate the Resurrection of Jesus - new beginnings, new life, fresh starts, new hope... With all that is happening in the world as I write this letter, peace seems in short supply, tensions are high and anxiety raised. Naturally, we are and should be concerned when disorder and confusion reign; we have had a lot to deal with in recent years enduring the pandemic and now conflict in Europe with war in Ukraine. If you are like me, all this turbulence and the instability it brings makes me wish for calmer times and the restoration of peace or at least peacefulness. You may not want me to remind you of the turmoil on our European doorstep, but this brings me directly back to Easter. Easter is not just about Jesus dying and coming back to life. Easter is about celebrating our new life through him. Pope Francis speaking of Easter said, "We proclaim the resurrection of Christ when his light illuminates the dark moments of our existence." At Midnight Mass we should read the prologue of the Gospel of John chapter one, verses 1-14; verse five gives us, 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.' Jesus came to bring light and life and through his resurrection has gifted to humanity the gift of eternal life. The resurrection is at the core of our beliefs as Christians. Without it, our faith is meaningless. It is through the eyes of faith that I view the world today and to quote Pope Francis again, "God is love and he has defeated evil." So, as we continue through this season of Easter, I will hold tight to the hope Christ has placed in us and pray for peace, which is not praying for peace in a juvenile sense, which would be naïve. What I hope and pray for is a deep peace, a peace that brings harmony, reconciliation and goodwill. A peace that is the presence of calm, quiet, stillness and tranquillity. Knowing that this is possible, humanly, with the grace of God. In this season of Easter up until the Day of Pentecost, whether you have a faith or not, hope for and if you will, pray for an outpouring of peace. I leave you with this Celtic blessing.

Deep peace of the moving waves to you, Deep peace of the flowing air to you,

Deep peace of the quiet earth to you, Deep peace of the shining stars to you,

Deep peace of the shepherds' watch to you, Deep peace of the Son of Peace to you And the blessing of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, be with you all, evermore. Amen.
