Weather Report - March 2023

Rainfall

It was the driest February that I have recorded. A mere 9.5mm compared with an average figure of 46mm. By all accounts it was the same elsewhere in the country. So far, March has given us 28mm, some of it as snow, but still below average.

Temperature

Up to halfway, February was mild (13.5°C high on the 3rd and -0.9°C low on the 5/6th). It stayed that way, with no further negative temperatures and several days up to 13.5°C.

For a winter month, February was quite sunny. The solar panels delivered 160kWh, exactly the same figure as in January.

March, by contrast, has been like a yoyo, cold snap followed by a mild spell and back again. It reached 13.8°C on the 13th and fell to -3.5°C on the night of 10th/11th.

Public Session - No matters were discussed.

Vehicle Activated Speed Signs - Three quotations from NYCC approved contractors considered. Agreed to accept quotation from SWARCO.

Noticeboard Refurbishment - Agreed to accept quotation from contractor Derek Harrison for refurbishment of noticeboard.

The Old Bus Shelter - Response awaited from contractor regarding remedial works required.

Trees - Agreed to accept quotation from arborist Greg Milburn for maintenance to village trees identified as needing intervention.

Old Churchyard - A concern has been raised regarding the old churchyard wall. Inspection and any necessary works to be completed.

Agreed to ask County Councillor Taylor if this can be purchased from his locality budget and to ask the Village Hall Committee if it would be possible to site this on the gable end of the Hall. Parish Council to pay for installation.

Village Maintenance - Request to new grass cutting contractor for cutting of the old churchyard hedge.

Concern regarding vehicles parked outside fish and chip shop blocking sight lines from North Back Lane to be passed to County Council.

Again we were using edible sugar paste, this time to make daffodils using a silicone mould. Julie kindly supplied each of us with a vanilla bun, covered in green sugar paste on which we placed our "daffodils", she even brought plastic bags to put our decorated buns in to take home.

Julie also brought a layer cake which she decorated, telling us that she thoroughly chills the cake in the fridge, then applies a thin layer of buttercream called a crumb coat before applying the sugar paste. She attached green paste "leaves" around the edge and a ribbon and the cake was topped with more "daffodils". She generously donated the cake to be baffled amongst us, and Liz was the lucky winner.

Stillington Squash Club has had a great season in the York & District Squash Leagues this year. With the season almost over, the men's 2nd team has reached the final of The Riley Cup – a handicap competition that pits teams from across all five divisions against one another. Having seen off Malton 2nd team in the semi-final, Stillington 2s will face Wigginton 7s on Tue 28th March, away at Wigginton Squash and Social Club. It is hoped that the inevitably partisan home support won't have too much of an impact on the overall outcome. Second team Captain, Mark Dransfield commented, "For a small village club like Stillington, it is fantastic to reach the final of such a well-regarded local competition. Success like this gives us a platform to let other people know that the game of squash is alive and well in the York and District area. Hopefully more people will see our success and will be tempted to come and give squash and racketball a try at our club."

Not to be outdone, the Ladies 1st Team also made it to the final of the equivalent competition, The Riley Rose Bowl, beating current league champions, Wigginton Ladies 1st Team, in the semi-finals. They will face either Bridlington or York RI in the final, which will be played at Dunnington Squash Club in May. This comes off the back of hosting a very well-attended female-only event in celebration of World Women's Squash Day on 8th March.

Lastly, the Men's 3rd team are top of the York & District Division 3 table with just a game to play. They face Wigginton 3s in a win-or-lose clash to determine who gets promoted.

Stillington Wanderers

27th February walk started from Coneysthorpe with rooks digging for chafer grubs or crane fly larvae on patches of the Green. The route was eastwards past Bog Hall; up the wooded hillside to Park House & along the northern ridge of Coneysthorpe Wood. Views of Castle Howard and the follies were often visible through the bare trees.

Rising temperatures after snow & frost left a very muddy/slippy surface for 13th March walk from Coxwold via Shandy Hall, Scencliffe Grange undergoing major construction works within its grounds; past the Michelin starred restaurant Black Swan at Oldstead and their locally grown vegetable and herb beds. Mature eucalyptus trees lined the road to Oldstead Grange and bemused walkers watched an 'adopted' young deer grazing peacefully amongst sheep at Cams Head.

Stillington Tennis Club

Stillington's tennis courts are back in play after a full resurface with synthetic grass. Contractors were delayed in starting before Christmas and wet weather stopped work in January. But now with the sand dressing settling into the carpet and three new court nets, all is ready for the 2023 season.

Farmland was originally acquired to extend the playing fields in 1974 and 1976 with interest from tennis and bowls members to establish tennis courts and a bowling green; the hockey club was formed 1979/80. The tennis courts were originally laid as shale in 1977; with a change to tarmac in 1986 partially encouraged with the regular watering and preparation that the shale surface required. The first synthetic grass surface was laid in 2008 and has lasted for 13 / 14 years.

Social tennis continues; junior coaching will be held on Saturday mornings 10th June to 15th July and matches for the two mixed teams in the York & District League start in May.

Countryside Notes

Tuesday 21st March. The days are now longer than the nights and the clocks change this coming weekend, so, winter is past according to our diaries. Today has been a very mixed weather day with cloud and short showers, followed by spells of sunshine. I heard on the news yesterday that the blossoming trees are a fortnight late in coming into flower because of the exceedingly dry month of February. The expert said the flowering trees were coming into blossom in Cornwall and flowering will move on northwards, so, with a bit of luck, by the time you read this, it will be with us. However, many trees are flowering now with catkins of various colours. Also, the Pussy Willow is going from silver to yellow pollen laden branches. Our Apricot tree is in flower and I hope the pollinators have done their job and Jack Frost has not reached the flowers through the fleece cover. The flowering of our trees often goes unnoticed but is worthy of a good look.

Yesterday, two Wood Pigeons were billing and cooing in a Sycamore in a sunny spell. From that same tree fell endless spinning keys that have alighted over a large area and, if they have their way, the Forest of Galtres will be replanted, as their rolled-up seed leaves are appearing everywhere and, no doubt, the Ash keys that germinate a little later will add more weeding in the garden.

Usually, I hear Curlew in February but not this year, so far. These birds are a joy to hear on a sunny warm summer's day, piping their peaceful melody for all to hear and enjoy. So, I hope that I have missed them, rather than they have missed us this year. There has been a male Skylark singing on a morning for some time, that is good to hear. We have a Tawny owl or owls living in large conifers round the house. What is puzzling me is why they are vocal in the daylight, when I thought they should be asleep. They find their own territory at the backend of the year, so I don't think that is the problem. Maybe it is a younger one that hasn't found a mate and is feeling lonesome.

There is a lot of work to do in the garden and lambing is only a month away. It is good though to see old plant friends popping up and some with flowers, like a patch of white Violets that we had almost forgotten were there and a lovely clump of Anemone Blanda with deep blue flowers opening to the full sun on Sunday morning. There is so much to see and do, as things respond to warmer and brighter days. Please don't miss them, they were given for our joy and pleasure.

Dear Friends,

Just after the second world war, early on a Saturday evening, there used to be a radio program called "In Town Tonight." The program interviewed celebrities and entertainers, many of whom were of the Jewish faith, since they were free to engage fully again with life after their Sabbath had ended at six o'clock.

It was after the Sabbath on the first day of the week that our Lord Jesus, the Light of the world, began shining again in the darkness of disappointed hope. Christians know this event as the Resurrection, and on the Saturday before Easter in Stillington we'll celebrate that light entering our lives once again. We use a special, non-liturgical commemoration, containing a beautiful reading, telling the story of that initial Easter event from the point of view of three women witnesses.

At the beginning of our commemoration from 7.30pm, as people join us, the church is in growing darkness while the evening draws on, and we are reminded what the return of that light means. At 8 o'clock the new light is brought through the church, and the large candle, known as the Christ candle, is lit. Then the whole church is lit by soft candle light making a sign of the cross in our midst.

Finally, after the peace and light of what has been achieved for us all has been witnessed, those who want to receive anointing for the indwelling of the Holy Spirit and healing for themselves, or for someone else who you hold in your heart, are invited forward one by one and are anointed.

We end with a short prayer and blessing, having been transformed from being disciples and servants of Jesus into being his friend, full of Easter joy and fun.

Come and meet our friend. He's In Town Tonight.

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions, as an act of love for Christ's creation and our fellow human beings. For April, then:

April - be informed, slow down and talk

1. Have a "staycation" or use public transport to travel abroad. A return flight to Greece emits 1 tonne CO2e - your whole 2019 reduction target!
2. Pray or think deeply, how ever you are inclined, about the renewal of creation or nature, for example local eco projects, halting species extinction, slowing down climate change.
3. If you are staying away, choose your hotel carefully. Depending on the level of luxury, meat served, food wasted, energy wasted with excess heating etc your night could cost you 3 to 60kg CO2e per person per night.
