

2023 Plant Sale

This Bring and Buy Plant Sale will be held on **Bank Holiday Monday** 1 st May, from 10am to 12 noon.

Annual Show

This will take place on Sunday August 13 th Schedules will be available from the shop in August.

May. Tips for the Garden:

- -Start planting out summer bedding towards the end of the month.
- -Look after your finished spring bulbs for next year.
- -Remember to open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days. You can also damp down your greenhouse on hot days to increase humidity and deter red spider mites.
- -Keep your lavender plants healthy with regular pruning.
- -Thin out drifts of hardy annuals.
- -Harden off half-hardy plants by leaving them outside during the day and bringing them back under cover at night for 7 to 10 days before planting outdoors.
- -Plant summer hanging baskets, adding good-quality compost, slow-release fertiliser and water-retaining crystals, to keep them in top condition. Protect them from late frost.
- -Continue dividing herbaceous perennials to improve vigour and create new plants.
- -Divide hostas as they come into growth.
- -Prune Penstemons now cut all the old shoots back to the base, providing there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves. **Robert Churton**

Countryside Notes May 2023

Wednesday, 19 th April. This morning is a little grey after yesterday's warm sunshine, that really gladdened the heart of all around. The Greylag Geese were feeding in the grass where the ewes are grazing, they took not the slightest bit of notice of me who was no more than sixty yards away on foot. They looked fine in the morning sunshine. This morning they are flying about and being very noisy but happy. I should have written this last night but time got away from me, after spending a long but profitable day at Malton Market selling prime Hoggs (last year's Lambs). Now we are due to start lambing tomorrow, the sheep are in good condition with plenty of grass in front of them to eat, rather different to last year when grass growth was late followed by drought and, admittedly, we had too many Ewes for the field.


What a glorious full colour palette is all around us as flowers



burst into bloom. The Dandelion is just coming into its full golden yellow glory on the roadsides along with Celandine and white Stitchwort, Wood Anemones, purple Violets and Primroses adorn many of the grass verge banks. Soon, the Cowslips

will be there, along with Bluebells where some are already in flower. Bluebells grow from bulbs and are rather persistent, marking out old hedge lines and ancient woodlands long since gone, as seen by old pasture land that grows these woodland flowers long past the time of the woodland trees have departed. The Blackthorn is spectacular this year, even though a bit late. There are many blossom trees around in gardens as well as in the hedgerows, maybe by the time you read these notes, the Hawthorn will be laden with its snow-white cascades of blossom, where now the buds are swelling, we will wait in anticipation for the glory of it.

The warmth has brought out some Butterflies: sulphur-yellow Brimstones in brilliant colour; Tortoiseshells, with their small blue spotted wings and, more recently, Orange-Tips, who have wonderful green marbling underwings



seeking "Jack by the Hedge", Honesty and other Brassicas to lay their eggs on.

Bird life is a bit on the low numbers side. We have a pair of Goldfinches at the feeder each morning, along with Tits and Tree Sparrows and the occasional Greater Spotted Woodpecker, while down the yard, we have Chaffinch and a goodly number of Yellowhammers in a flock, feeding around the sheep troughs.

Yesterday, there were four Herons in one field. I guess that they are last year's young that haven't started to nest. Herons nest in trees in colonies known as Heronries, nesting in February.

Last night as I walked towards a building corner, I was surprised by a Cock Pheasant flying very low

and in an argument with another. The tactic was to land and be ready to fight before the antagonist had time to land, a good surprise tactic, but the surprise was to be his for he did a somersault in mid-air, before departing with a lot of noise upon seeing me.

Stillington and Farlington WI

On Wednesday 12th April, we welcomed Dan Shrimpton to talk to us about the Joseph Rowntree Theatre. It is the only remaining Rowntree building still used for it's original purpose and is Grade II listed. It was opened initially in 1935 but closed during the War and re-opened in 1946. In 2003 it became a charity and in 2012 it was sold to York St. John. In 2017 the charity bought the freehold of the building. From the outset, it has been run by volunteers who currently number over 170 and include the Trustees who manage the theatre, stage crew, box office, fundraising, marketing, front of house and refreshments. At the moment major work is on-going to replace areas of the roof (some of which is still covered with original 1930's roof tiles). There are further development plans under discussion, the foyer of the theatre is very small with many short flights of steps limiting access for the less able although there is wheelchair access via a side door. An extension to form a useful community space would be ideal but much discussion will be needed in order to satisfy the strict criteria which comes with being a listed building.

This was a really interesting talk, highlighting many aspects of what happens behind the scenes of stage shows ranging from lighting and scenery changes to structural security and health and safety.

Our next meeting will be our AGM so is not open to visitors. I will let you know about our June meeting nearer the time..... watch this space!!

Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions, as an act of love for Christ's creation and our fellow human beings. For May, then:

May - Share the Love

- 1. Join the Climate Coalition Speak Up week www.theclimatecoalition.org to voice your concerns about our children's futures, to our elected representatives.
- 2. Write to your local councillor or MP about a local or national eco issue. There are top tips on how at www.hftf.org.uk . Be polite, don't make it about party politics and make sure you are not being a NIMBY.
- 3. Halve the carbon cost of every car journey by car sharing. A medium car emits 360g of CO2 a mile whether it has one, two or more people in it. Join a car share club online and save up to £1000 a year.

Weather Report - April 2023

Rainfall

March was as wet as February was dry. Rainfall totalled 68mm, about half as much again as usual and the second highest figure in eighteen years. So far, April has also been wet, 39.5mm up to the 15 th, compared with an average figure of 37mm for the month.

Temperature

The highest temperature in March was 16.3°C on the 17 th and the lowest was -3.5° C on the 10 th /11 th . With all that rain there was not a lot of sunshine. My panels generated 250kWh, the lowest March figure since 2018. During the first half of April it has begun to feel spring-like. Temperatures have reached ten degrees or more every day and on four days exceeded fifteen degrees. However, nights have been quite chilly, with a low of 0.3°C on the 2 nd /3 rd . M.T.

Wow! There is guite a lot to celebrate this month and who doesn't like to celebrate?

It seems that no matter what ever your cup of tea may be, there's something somewhere that will give you cause to celebrate, be it a birthday, anniversary or any other number of events. This May we can't help but notice one significant event, the Coronation of King Charles III on Saturday the 6 th of May, there will be a plethora of events being held up and down the country, and around the world. Well, that got me thinking about celebrating, and in particular, what else we could be celebrating this month. In the Church we will be celebrating the Ascension of Jesus Christ into heaven on Thursday the 18 th, and then on Sunday the 28 th we celebrate the birth of the Church on Pentecost (any excuse for a party if you ask me).
