Public Session

Matters discussed were planning applications, VASS posts, the Parkfield snicket, the new car park sign, the new bench and the defibrillator use.

Casual Vacancy

Applications received for the vacancy on the Council were considered.

Parish Council Website

A new website has been developed and will be launching soon.

Horse Caution Sign

A warning sign is to be erected at the Mill corner to warn motorists of the potential presence of horses and their riders.

Vehicle Activated Speed Sign (VASS) Signs

The pole erected for the VASS sign, to the Easingwold entrance of the village, will be moved by North Yorkshire Highways to allow the sign to be seen. Two signs have recently been received with the ancillary equipment and will be deployed as soon as possible.

Land Registration

Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

A few handy tips for every household to understand

October -What's on the menu?

- 1. Learn how to cook a new vegetarian or vegan meal each week. Why? Switching to plant-based protein is better for both your health and your carbon budget. 1kg weight: beef/lamb 19kg CO2e; chicken 4.5kg CO2e; beans 2kg CO2e; and lentils 0.9 kg CO2e.
- 2. Cut back on cheese and dairy products. Cows produce methane, which is a very strong greenhouse gas. Eat more plant-based alternatives like oat or soya "milk", hummus, olives, nuts and seeds.
- 3. Drink tap water. Bottled water comes with a 320g per litre carbon footprint, tap water a mere 0.24g CO2e per litre. If you don't like the taste of your home tap water, install an under-the-sink water filter.

Weather Report

Rainfall

The second half of August was less wet than the first, so the monthly total came out at 88.5mm, a little over the average figure.

The first half of September has been relatively dry, 20.5mm so far.

Temperature

August was mostly cool. Temperatures only reached 20°C on eleven days. The highest temperature was 26.3°C, on the 10th.

The solar panels delivered 370kWh, a little less than in July.

The second week in September gave us some overdue summer temperatures, the highest being 27.6°C, on the 9th. The lowest overnight was 9.3°C on the 12th/13th.

As we move into the second half of the month it has become distinctly autumnal. MT

Neighbourhood Watch (NBW) – how to continue 2024 and beyond?

The village is currently covered by a number of volunteer coordinators, currently 17, some of whom have been helping for over 30 years, who either receive Police NHW email messages direct or through the lead village co-ordinator. Stillington NHW was originally established on behalf of the Parish Council and the aim has been to circulate messages, relevant to our area, to each group of houses.

Village Facebook messages are now more instant. We do our best but neither message system is fool-proof.

Our lead coordinator will be retiring in the New Year 2024 and we shall need a new 'lead' if residents wish to retain a village-wide NHW.

Providing individual co-ordinators are willing to continue, their group of houses will still be within a 'communication link'; nowadays, it's usually by email.

Any resident can register with the Police to receive the messages via alert@neighbourhoodalert.co.uk.

We thank all our NHW volunteers who currently help; those who have since retired and a special thanks to the long serving members. It will call for a party!

Sunflower Competition


Next year it is intended to hold another "Sunflower" competition. Again, it will be the size of head, diameter, which will determine the overall winner. Seedlings will be given out at the plant sale so everyone has an equal chance of winning.

Countryside Notes

Monday 18th September, another day of cloud, midday rain and sun. There is now plenty of late green new grass in the fields and of course the lawn, all of which is good when we consider the dry burnt grass of late June. Fields are being sown with Corn and Rape, which is well up now. However, recent heavy rain has soaked away quickly, which suggests the Water Table is still low.

I am a little concerned about our wonderful Ash trees: they are being affected by Ash Dieback, an imported disease which I have felt has been exaggerated by the media and experts for a number of years. I must admit that there does appear to be a lot of dead branches on many ash trees, which are becoming more apparent as the leaf canopy opens up. However, the Ash has had a difficult time over recent years, being one of the last to come into full leaf and often the first to drop its leaves in autumn, especially if there is an early frost, which leads to a short growing season for a tree that likes plenty of rain for its shallow root system and cooler temperatures in summer. Spring droughts and high temperatures are not at all for its liking. The trees look rather a bit yellow in leaf as if they have been starved, but maybe this yellow look is caused by a bumper crop of Keys (seeds) hung in branches and yellowing as they ripen. This heavy crop of seed may be a survival technique or just a result of last year's

The ash tree provides strong straight timber that is fairly flexible, so it makes good tool handles and was used a lot in the old horse days for carts and other machinery. The old cartwheels were made of Elm for the hub because the interlocking grain of wood would not crack or split. The spokes were ash as they had to flex on uneven ground and the felloes, which link the spokes to the iron tyre, were made of Oak, which was hard and solid, holding the wheel together.



Animals grazing will eat ash leaves when they fall with relish and I guess they contain minerals that help prepare the animal for winter.

Today's wind broke down our magnificent tall Sunflowers that have grown where the bird feeder was so busy last winter. Also, after the lunchtime rain, the vivid scarlet berries of the dark red-leaved Berberis shone like jewels in bright sunshine.

Birds are just coming out of Eclipse in their new feathers, so their vulnerable time is passing. Ruffled, worn feathers are not good for flight and escape from predators. The Robins have returned from the woods and while seeking territory for the winter and spring are singing to us. So rejoice with them in the glory of the autumn with its fair-well colours.
