#### Notice from the Stillington News Editors



### Vandalism in our Village

Vandalism is an illegal and anti-social activity and we are sad to be reporting that there have been several incidents around our village once again. Food has been stolen from the foodbank box, stored inside the church porch doorway: the contents of a pasta sauce jar were spilled down the High Street, (north side) pathway above York Road junction; a glass jar and glass bottle were thrown onto the road; a packet of rice opened and its contents dropped midway up the High Street path (north side); eggs were also stolen from a stall on North Back Lane and thrown around.

In the early hours of the morning footsteps were heard running along the High Street path and someone was knocking on the different front doors. All of these incidents will be reported to the police

#### **Stillington Wanderers**

A local walk round Huby on 26th February was adjusted for the wet conditions: this was also a chance to view the grand new shop & frontage for Huby & Sutton Community Shop. No clear skies or string of racehorses sadly for Sutton Bank, Cleveland Way & Hambleton racecourse walk on 11th March but we did see the variety of cycle tracks now available for all ages.

#### **Stillington WI**

On Wednesday 13th March Stillington and Farlington WI welcomed Gelda Churton to talk to us about flowers, how to get the best out of cut flowers and curing some of the commonly occurring problems which most of us have encountered.

Soft stemmed flowers like tulips and gerberas often droop. This can be prevented by inserting and removing a pin through the stem just below the flower head. This releases the air block in the hollow stem allowing the uptake of water.

Containers should be filled approx 2/3 full and any leaves either on the flowers or greenery should be stripped off, this helps keep the water clean. The water should be changed every couple of days.

Gelda then took a bunch of 'supermarket' flowers, trimmed each stem diagonally to give the greatest surface area for water uptake and arranged them with some added greenery, into a beautiful display.

A twiggy branch was anchored in a shallow container using a 'hedgehog' (a weighted spiky gadget more environmentally friendly than 'oasis'), surrounded by greenery and daffodils. Little Easter egg ornaments were hung from the branch to make a lovely Easter decoration.

Next month we meet on Wednesday 10th April at 7:30pm when we will hear about the Resistance in Montcony in France during WW2.

All visitors welcome, £4 including refreshments.

#### Weather Report March 2024 Rainfall

During February, rainfall in Stillington amounted to 84.5mm. This was well above the average figure of 46mm, but did not break any records. In 2020 we had 110mm.

So far, up to the twelfth, March has given us a mere 22mm, though overcast and drizzly days have made it seem more.

#### Temperature

We are told that nationally February was very mild. In Stillington we did have an unseasonal warm spell in the middle of the month, reaching  $14.5^{\circ}$ C on the 14th. There were no sharp frosts to cut down the premature spring flowers, though overnight the temperature did fall below zero on a couple of occasions (-0.5°C on the 23rd /24th and -0.1°C the next night.) Solar panel output, of 120kWh, was the lowest February total since 2017.

March, so far, has been a little on the cool side up until yesterday, the 12th, when a mild spell started. Today it has reached 15 °C.

### **Stillington Oil Co-operative**

Stillington Oil Co-operative is a member of the Lower Swale Oil Syndicate. The LSOS consists of nine volunteer-run co-operatives. Collectively we have nearly 1,000 members living in some thirty settlements local to Easingwold and buy around 1.5 million litres of heating oil annually.

As a price benchmark, we use the daily heating oil prices published by Boilerjuice. Boilerjuice say that they take the lowest price from each postcode district in their network for 1,000 litres\* of heating oil and use this information to plot the average heating oil price for England. Whilst this doesn't necessarily reflect local rates which may, of course, be higher, it does provide a useful indicator as to the savings members are making by being part of the LSOS.

\* Please note that members of the LSOS can order the minimum quantity of 500 litres at the LSOS, whereas most suppliers charge a premium for deliveries of less than 1,000 litres.

The chart below compares the price paid by LSOS members with the Boilerjuice price.



Taking an average across the whole year, members saved 4.73p/litre (6.7%) against the Boilerjuice price. On 06 January 2023, the Syndicate price was 18.7% lower than Boilerjuice, saving 16p/litre.

Membership of the Stillington Oil Co-operative is open to households in and around Stillington and surrounding villages.

#### Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions, as an act of love for Christ's creation and our fellow human beings. For April, then:



- Spend less time in the shower. Spending one minute less in the shower each day will save up to £7 off your energy bills each year, per person. Heating water uses a lot of energy.

- 2. Turn off the tap while cleaning your teeth. The clean water that flows out of your tap needs energy in many stages of processing and transport before it gets to the tap. Don't waste it!
- 3. If your toilet cistern holds more than 6 litres of water (likely if it was installed before 2001) put a Hippo Water Saving device (or a brick) in it to save water each time you flush (eg http://www.hippo-the-watersaver.co.uk/)

#### **Stillington Parish Council**

The Council meeting was on Wednesday 6th March 2024 in the Village Hall with Cllrs Christine Cookman (Chairman), Graham Taylor, Robert Churton, Richard Smyth, Cllr Tracy Sinclair and Cllr Tim Milburn together with 7 members of the public. Apologies were received from Cllr Tim Drew and North Yorkshire Cllr Malcolm Taylor.

#### **Public Session**

Matters discussed: the village green, horse warning signs, a haulage application, parking line markings and faded school warning signs.

#### North Yorkshire Councillor's Report

Cllr Taylor has reported that following a recent site meeting with Highways, an officer will be visiting the site outside the Primary School in order to assess what can be done regarding improved access.

#### **Demolished Barn**

NYC Planning Enforcement have confirmed that emergency permission has been given to demolish the barn and a retrospective planning application will be submitted.

#### Vandalism

Recent cases of vandalism to the bus shelter, birdsmouth fencing, windows and cars have been reported to the police. A visit had been requested to attend today's meeting but no reply received.

#### Track around the Green

It has been established that the track around the village has been repaired in the past by the Parish Council. A contractor will be found to undertake repairs. Ownership of the track is still unknown.

#### Street Lighting on York Road.

An estimate of £3,500 has been received from North Yorkshire Council to install an additional light on York Road. It was agreed to wait until the new estate is built to see if a light is still required.

#### **Countryside Notes**

Sunday 17th March, another day of sunshine and showers. Last week there were some signs of the weather beginning to dry up, but not for long. Already there is much colour bursting out in the hedgerows: the new green of bursting leaf buds on the Hawthorn is so pleasant a green that it was known as poor mans "Bread and Cheese", don't know why! The Blackthorn's creamy white flowers are bursting forth; nearer the hedge bottom, there is growth showing of Stitchwort, Bluebells, Bog Myrtle, Umbellifers of one sort and another. The Scurvy Grass on the side of the York Road is showing its little white flower close to the road curb. Scurvy Grass is really a marine plant with round fleshy leaves that has moved away from the salt-coast line because of our Highways Departments using salt on roads in winter and I guess that traffic picks up seed and spreads it around.

Today, I have been to an Old Folks' Home visiting residents. How good it is to share the wonder of nature with them and help them bring back memories so golden and rich that have been a big part of their lives. That rich memory bank has been created by looking, seeing and rejoicing in the miracle of Spring. I hope that we all are making a memory bank to draw from in days to come.

Recently, I have noticed the footprints of Roe Deer in the orchard and some droppings very close to the house. So, I think we must have some nocturnal visitors, occasionally the dogs bark in the night, no doubt not enjoying the visitors who I reckon will be after new shoots and buds in the orchard and perhaps in the garden. However, it would be nice if a Doe had a Fawn or two for us to see and enjoy. We will look out and report later.

We have a lot of hungry birds about, devouring peanuts and fat balls in large quantities. They are in splendid apparel with their new plumage full of colour and shine. No doubt in their best for the Romantic Season is upon them. There are Blue, Great, Coal and Long-tailed Tits along with Hedge Sparrows, House Sparrows, Chaffinches and brilliant Yellowhammers enjoying seed, whilst Blackbirds, Robins and Wrens are hunting around the garden. They have started to sing on a morning, which is good to hear. There was a lot of cheeping in the trees at the surgery last week from a flock of Linnets or Redpolls or both, however the light was wrong for a true identification but they were certainly busy hunting seed.

The Ewes were scanned last week with a scan of 159% lambs, comprising 4 triplets, 44 twins, 21 singles and 7 barren ewes. Scanning helps me to know which ewes need extra care, the triplets want a more careful looking to and are not really what we want as that extra lamb has not got a teat and will fight for survival with its siblings, which makes for a hard life for them and for mother. Lamb numbers are controlled by the ewe in autumn and by the nutrition their feed is comprised of that triggers a biological calculation as to how many lambs she will be able to raise. The wet, cold conditions were not so good at the critical time of this year.

There is much happening around at this time for us to enjoy, so keep eyes and ears open to see the miracle of change as new life emerges.
