Weather Report - June / July

Rainfall

In June there was no recorded rainfall on seventeen separate days. The monthly total of 45.5mm, was well below the average figure of 69mm.

By contrast, the first half of July has been abnormally wet, with 61mm up to the half-way point. A large part of this was the 31mm which fell on the 9th. Around the country there have been reports of "a month's worth of rain in a day". We only managed half a month's worth.

Temperature

The lowest overnight temperatures in June, 6.5°C, were early in the month.

The highest, 26.1°C, occurred during the 'one week of summer' from the 20th to the 27th, when day-time temperatures were in the twenties.

Solar panel output, at 425kWh, was the lowest for four years.

In July, so far, the temperature has exceeded 20°C only once, on the 15th. Maybe we are on the verge of another warm spell? It would be nice to see the sun more often. Solar panel output up to the 15th is a mere 170kWh.



Eco Top Tips from St Nicholas' Church

Every month the Eco-Working Group at St Nicholas' Church gives a few handy tips for every household to understand and control their carbon emissions. For August, then:

August – In the car

- 1. In the car drive away immediately when starting from cold: idling to heat the engine wastes fuel and causes rapid engine wear.
- 2. When driving, the most efficient speed depends upon the car in question but is typically around 55 65mph, faster speeds will greatly increase your fuel consumption. Slow down and allow a little more time for journeys.
- 3. Change your car breakdown cover to a company that campaigns for better environmental transport measures, rather than being part of the road transport lobby eg Environmental Transport Association **www.eta.co.uk**
- 4. Switch your engine off if you pull over or are stuck in traffic for even a minute. It saves you fuel, reduces the nitrous oxide pollution for you and those around you and cuts noise pollution.



Countryside Notes

Tuesday 16th July, another month passed and one of changeable weather, everything but snow and ice; yet what a difference in the crops since I last wrote a tale of dire doom. Just a few warmer days and the Green Brush had painted colour into growing crops including gold among the corn which are now preparing to ripen for harvest. The sheep are also enjoying the greener, sweeter grass.

There has been a visiting young Heron on the lawn, so good to see its colours and long neck at close quarters and its observant looks and leisurely departures on those massive wings. But, better, has been the visits of a Leveret, which is about one third grown. It is very cautious as it grazes and frequently stops and erects its ears, moving them round to locate the tiniest sound.

Today, we had a Robin singing for a short time, reminding us that the days are shortening and their need of a territory and a mate for spring next year. A Tawny Owl has called in the afternoon, looking and listening for a mate to share winter with too.

There are Hazel nuts swelling and filling ready for the winter feeding of the birds and squirrels. Not only Hazel, but our poor Walnut tree also has a good crop of green coated nuts. This tree was not thriving, so our forebears moved it and an Ash and a Sycamore both robbed it of light, so it now grows more like a prostrate shrub. We once tried to pickle some of the nuts, without success. The Grey Squirrels take the nuts before they are ripe enough to store but the Red Squirrels are not able to cope with them in this unripe stage.

The Apples are swelling and there looks to be a good crop in the offing. But the best is an Apricot tree pinned to a wall, a lot of fruit was set but most came to nought. However, the ones left are large, colourful fruit with a red blush, they are a good flavour as I took one off and ripened it inside. It weighed five ounces. The rest just want a few warm days to ripen and sweeten them.

We have the most magnificent show of Tropaeolum or Scotch Flame Flower, a perennial climbing, rambling nasturtium that has climbed up shrubs and festooned them with scarlet racemes of brilliance. There is much in the garden to enjoy and to relax in. Must find time!

Making a difference – one bar of soap at a time

"The King will reply, 'What I'm about to tell you is true. Anything you did for one of the least important of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:40

For many years churches and other organisations have been supporting food banks. These address issues of food poverty. Hygiene poverty is a hidden crisis, affecting people in the UK. Many of those are in work, but simply do not have enough to cover the basics that most of us take for granted. We also know that hygiene poverty disproportionately affects young people, and those with a disability. People are making impossible choices between putting the heating on for a few minutes or buying toothpaste. Losing a job, an accident or long-term health condition, the breakdown of a relationship can plunge us into debt. Hygiene poverty is uniquely oppressive because it stops people accessing education and going for job interviews.

Sheriff Hutton Methodist church has teamed up with other local Methodist churches to support The Hygiene Bank in York. The Hygiene Bank believes that everyone deserves to feel clean and that their support can be part of the safety net people need to stop people falling further into poverty.

A yellow dustbin in church is a collection point for new toiletries - shampoo, soap, shower gel, anti-perspirant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, sanitary products, toilet rolls, disposable nappies, etc. All must be in unopened, original packaging except nappies where part packs are accepted.

Donations can be brought to our coffee morning, on Wednesday mornings and to the Sunday service for passing on to The Hygiene Bank. The Hygiene Bank has partnered with a range of local charities dealing with social exclusion, poverty and homelessness to ensure that our donations are reaching those most in need.

As a church we are challenged by God to reach out to those in need. However, addressing poverty is not just the preserve of the church and I know that many of you have a heart for social justice.
