Eco-tips for clearing up after Christmas from St Nicholas church

- 1. About 6 8 million Christmas trees go to landfill each year . Make use of our local green bin session on 8th January 2024 to dispose of your tree so that it can go into the waste recycling system.
- 2. Other natural decorations eg holly and ivy can also go into the 8th January green bin collection or the soft leafy parts can go into your home compost.
- 3. Re-use cards and wrapping paper e.g. keep cards to cut out gift tags for next Christmas .
- 4. Some Christmas wrapping paper can be recycled but not if it's covered with glitter. For another year think of making some draw-string bags to put presents in instead of paper wrapping. But most wrapping paper is not recyclable. You can test it by doing the 'scrunch' test. If it springs back, it isn't recyclable. And always remove the sellotape before recycling.
- 4. What can you do with leftover food? We all know ways of using up leftover turkey e.g curry, fricassee. Keep leftover food in the fridge so that it can be used up over a longer period.
- 5. Keep feeding the birds through the cold weather and try to maintain open water for them to drink from.
- 6. Leave some untidy areas in your garden for sheltering insects and even perhaps a hibernating hedgehog.

Countryside Notes January 2024

December 12 th, another damp misty day after daily rain that has flooded much farmland in the area for a long period of time. This will have done a lot of harm to a lot of winter sown corn. There are fields where soil compaction from heavy machinery is shown in yellowing stripes in the leaves of the new crop, not good news for soil structures, which will call for sub-soiling to get through and below the compacted soil, or a very dry summer where the clay soils will crack and contract before the rain expands them again. Soil is such a vital part in agriculture and its delicate structure must be looked after.

Fortunately, I made the decision to bring our last year's lambs out off the cold and wet grass to go inside to keep them warm and dry, also to get them on a better plane of nutrition and, though they have only been in a week, they look better. Their wool is brighter and clean, just as our hair shows our health for better or worse. I cannot see the sense in feeding expensive feed into sheep to only use it to keep warm and still be hungry. We have had a joy through this atrocious weather: a yellow Welsh Poppy, with its orange-fringed petals opened up and though frosted and soaked in the last 12 days through the frost and rain, every day it picked up when the sun shone, even a little bit. Now there is a healthy round bud trying to open up. We will see whether it will open. Of course, these poppies are really a spring flower and can be a weed, which is only a plant in the wrong place.

This morning 5 or 6 Long Tailed Tits were working hard at the fat balls put out for them and their cousins. They are very busy little birds, always on the move and the look out. We have not the number of birds at the feeders that we usually have, however, they are always hungry for fat balls that have gone up in price since last year.

We have a fair few furry tailed rats, more commonly called Grey Squirrels about, which I suppose I should be controlling. They do amazing acrobatics in the trees as they leap from branch to branch, and scuttle along the roofs of the farm buildings, where they have hidey-holes. There has been war on these rodents all my life and before. 70 years ago, there was a government bounty on squirrel tails in an attempt to protect woodland plantings. Recently, I read that a Pine Marten was seen at Spurn Point. Why it should be there, no one knows as there are few trees for miles around and no vast forestry. The pine marten is, I understand, making a comeback in its home surroundings in Scotland, and is proving an asset in controlling grey squirrels. The Pine Marten is a Mustelid, or a member of the Stoat and Weasel family, and hunts the Grevs up the trees. However, the beloved Red Squirrel, being lighter, can climb higher than its cousin and keep out of harm's way.

I read that there are a lot of beautiful Waxwings about this year, so watch for them eating berries on the hedgerows. I haven't seen one for years but I will watch out for them.

Enjoy Christmas and get out and see what you can and get an appetite for all those goodies (naughty but nice). **R & M**

Twelfth Night – the Feast of the Epiphany

[I know you may well be reading this ahead of New Year, if you just imagine you're now into January.] Well that was Christmas, over and done with for another year - turkey finished (don't know about you but I can't get enough turkey and cranberry sauce), tree down and decorations boxed up ready for next Christmas, presents put neatly away and 'thank you's written. Christmas is over and done with for another year... or is it?? As we step across the threshold of a new year it might seem as if carol singing and 'baby Jesus lying in a manger' are a dim and distant memory of the 'old year'. The shepherds have done what shepherds do and have gone back to watch their flocks and there is not an angel in sight. You might even reckon that the wise men have rode off across moor and mountain on their camels, travelling far to wherever they came from. But just hang on a second, these wise men haven't gone anywhere just yet, that's because the wise men actually turn up a little later, we have made them part of the Christmas story in a sort of condensed version of events, The wise men or the Magi (pronounced Mah-ji), their part in the story, for us, comes in January, on 6th when the Church celebrates the season of Epiphany (Epiphany meaning 'to reveal that which is hidden'). Baby Jesus was probably a little older and Mary and Joseph were unlikely to still be sheltering in a stable and this part of the story is set against a backdrop of the reign of a jealous tyrant king (Herod) whose cruelty will mean the young Holy family will soon need to flee and become refugees in another land. The season of Epiphany is like a continuation or the next chapter following Christmas with the wise men visiting the infant Jesus bringing their gifts from afar. This moment is much bigger and has more relevance than we may first realise as this part of the story, the Christmas story is about revealing to the world who this child really is. And this child will grow up and change the world.

Let's just think of the gifts these men bring, these are not minor-league gifts by any measure, they are top drawer, first rate expensive gifts, they are the best that these wise men could give. And they give them to a baby, but no ordinary baby, but a child who is God. It always amazes me that the gifts are presented and the men simply up and leave for home by another route having first found the King they were looking for by following a star.

I hope you have been able to keep Christmas going beyond celebrating the New Year and on up to the 6 th of January, (the Feast of the Epiphany) and beyond. Traditionally the 6 th of Jan is when we take down our Christmas decs, yet the season of Epiphany lasts until the 2 nd of February. Maybe, somehow, through the season of Epiphany is means of extending into the New Year so we can take onboard the fuller meaning of Christmas and the reason for the season, and by it be reminded that the story of Christmas doesn't end with our New Year celebrations; the Story continues, the story of our God and Saviour who came to walk among us, to live as one of us 2,000 years ago, and still does today.

Wishing you a very happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.
