

## Weather Report June 2024

#### Rainfall

May was relatively dry for twenty one days. Then, in the last ten days, it delivered 58mm of rain, giving a total of 68mm for the month, slightly above the average figure.

June, so far, has given us 26mm, under half the average monthly figure.

#### **Temperature**

The lowest temperature in May was 8.3°C on the 7th /8th. The highest was 23.9°C on the 9th and again on the 13th.

Solar panel output, of 380kWh, was the lowest May total that I have recorded.

Up to the half-way point, June has not delivered much in the way of summer temperatures. Only twice, on the 2nd and 3rd, has it reached 20°C. Night time temperatures have been generally mild, apart from a chilly 6.5°C on two nights. **M.T.**

### Remote annual review of prescriptions

If you are due a medication review (normally annually) or request a repeat prescription, you may receive a call from one of the Surgery's Remote Clinical Pharmacists. They can talk to you about the medication and will make decisions on any medication requests. The Remote Clinical Pharmacists are Shakeel, Aysha and Harris. If the Surgery has your contact details (mobile number or email) you will be advised in advance to expect a phone call from one of the Remote Clinical Pharmacists. Use of Remote Clinical Pharmacists releases GP time to allow them to see more patients.

## **Quality Outcome for Everyone**

Stillington Surgery is introducing a new patient recall system, referring to clinical system records, to attempt to ensure that all patients are appropriately monitored whether they be on a long-term disease register or a specific drug. ### CONSULTATION NOTICE STILLINGTON ST NICHOLAS PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

LAND ON THE CORNER OF WANDELL BANK AND MOOR LANE, STILLINGTON

PROPOSED ORDER UNDER SECTION 62 OF THE CHARITIES ACT 2011

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

- 1. That the PCC intend to make an application to the Charity Commission for an order or scheme under section 62 of the Charities Act 2011 in respect of the above mentioned land.
- 2. The purpose of section 62 of the Charities Act 2011 is to alter the original purposes of a charitable gift to allow the property given, or part of it, to be applied cy-pres where the original purposes, in whole or in part, have been fulfilled or cannot be carried out.
- 3. The land is used for bell string and other necessaries.
- 4. "The Bells" are made up of three parts. There is the structure in the tower to support the bellframe and bells which was replaced two years ago at a cost of approximately £20,000. There is a bell frame itself which was originally condemned and full circle ringing of the bells forbidden until a full survey carried out in February confirmed that, with some minor modifications, the frame was fit for purpose and full circle ringing could re-commence. Thirdly, there are the bells themselves and, whilst these can be rung, approximately £25,000 is needed to completely refurbish the three bells and their fittings, fit new headstocks, replace all bearings and bell wheels and replace the three bell ropes.
- 5. The PCC intend to apply to the Charity Commission for a scheme in which a declaration is sought confirming the land is help by the PCC on an unrestricted basis and that the PCC has the power to sell the land and apply the proceeds of sale to further the charitable purposes of the PCC.
- 6. The funds will be used to repair and maintain the bells.
- 7. The purpose of this Notice is to provide notice to the public and those in the locality, of the intention of the PCC to apply to the Charity Commission for such a scheme, and to enable a consultation process so that any comments in relation to such a scheme being applied for, can be made known to the PCC.

- 9. This consultation is being carried out on behalf of the PCC DATED 1 July 2024

## WI Report

those of you who didn't come to our meeting on 12th June, YOU MISSED A TREAT!! It was interesting, educational, sad and funny.

Trish from the Morndyke Parrot Sanctuary came to talk to us. The sanctuary opened about a year ago, as a result of her daughter wanting a holiday job at a pet shop. Spotting a lone parrot looking stressed, Trish bought it, then looked for another of the same breed to keep it company. The search took her to the internet site "Preloved" ( I thought they just sold clothes!!) where she bought 40 unwanted parrots. Her husband built an aviary and the sanctuary began.

It was a steep learning curve, there are over 400 species of parrot, with about a third under threat of extinction. Many lose their habitat through deforestation, others are trapped and shipped to Europe and North America in horrific conditions causing a high percentage to die. Work is under way to lobby Parliament to make it illegal to sell parrots on the internet and shut down backyard breeders who keep the birds in dreadful conditions.

Trish realised that a big part of the problem of unintentional cruelty is a lack of knowledge so she now works with young people doing Duke of Edinburgh awards, work experience, university and college students as well as vets who study very little parrot science.

At the moment the sanctuary is home to 160 birds and although they can live very long lives, sometimes up to 50 years, many of her birds don't due to stress, poor feeding in their previous life or physical damage. Her motto is Freedom, Flight and Flock, so they can live a life as close as possible to their natural one.

## Countryside Notes July 2024

Sunday, 16 th June, I am starting to write as the light fails on a damp, cold evening, with mist enshrouded mountain in the distance. Cat Bells top has come and gone since we arrived here at Keswick this afternoon. Our Guest House lies by the Miniature Golf Course at the northern end of Derwent Water. To the left of the window, there is a fine Monkey Puzzle tree, it is an old tree whose lower limbs have been removed to give other holiday makers a better view of the lake, that has revealed a very straight trunk for two-thirds of its height to reveal a large dense top, with the makings of seed prickly balls. However, the trunk shows no sign of tapering to my sight and no branches until the mop-head is reached. We are for home on Tuesday!!

I hear the sun was shining back home, as it was when we left this morning. We all are not thrilled with the recent weather that we have had. Some seed sown nearly three weeks ago is emerging to where it should have been after 8 days in more usual times. The sheep would like some more sunshine to get the sugars to be pulled up to add to the nutritional food content. This sugar content adds to the quality of both Hay and Silage and the resultant needs of the stock to thrive, so more protein will be needed for winter feed.

Monday 17th, a different day that makes me wonder about last night's writings. But, our British Weather is dependably unpredictable. Fine sunshine and cloud gave a wonderful light to this magnificent Lakeland Scenery. Back to the home, things to report. One was the sound of a Snipe "Roding", a courtship sound made by air rushing through tail and wing feathers as they dive down from a height. Many of our birds will be going into eclipse; the time when the new clothes of spring are getting worn and dulled with family life. There will be a time of sombre habits and hiding away. A bird in this period has not the speed needed to escape predators, who themselves may need easy meals to feed their young. Thankfully, Ash trees have, at last, got a good healthy head of leaves. I wondered if Ash Dieback was worse than I had thought. The wonderful smell of Acacia trees has been very good, along with Honeysuckle and Mock Orange is about to burst into full bloom. More things to look out for along with the garden treasures, enjoying each in due season.
