What an incredible return to school we have had here at Stillington community school. Our Key Stage Two pupils have delved into the past focusing on the Shang Dynasty exploring culture, beliefs and historical figures through their

history and English topics. KS1 embarked on a journey into the past by studying 'London's burning' to reveal what life was like in 17th century London and the impact the great fire had on our capital city. EYFS have loved looking at the own history through our topic of 'My Family – History and me' to understand their own heritage and recreating baby pictures through art.

Stillington Walks

26th August walk was from Huttons Ambo along the River Derwent, railway & the swing footbridge. The historic village board and map outside the church at High Hutton had plenty of interest.

9 September walk as from Newton on Ouse, visiting Linton Lock with its modern hydroelectric plant with two Archimedes screw installed in 2011 and 2016, enough to power 450 homes. The first scheme was abandoned in the 1960's. Initial plans went protracted through a planning process with rival schemes promoted on the bank (Hambleton council) and south bank (Harrogate council). Funds were eventually provided to rebuild a new fish ladder and to install a national standard canoe slalom course.

Stillington Bowls Club

The final match of the season for our team in the Ryedale and District Veterans League was on 4th September when we played Hutton le Hole at home. The game ended with a win for Stillington earning us 8.25 points out of a maximum of 10 and confirming our 3rd place in the final league table.

However the highlight of the season was the Sundella Cup Final in which we played Thornton le Dale at the neutral ground of Helmsley Bowls Club. It was a closely fought match ending in a great win for Stillington by just 2 points - 64 to 62.

Weather Report September 2024

Rainfall - Historically, August has been the wettest month of the year with an average figure of 78mm. This year we received only 14.5mm. The only comparable figure was in 2022. Climate change? The first half of September has given us 20.5mm, about a third of the average figure.

Temperature - The second half of August did not give us any high temperatures, so the maximum for the month was the 25.9°C recorded on the twelfth. The lowest overnight temperature was 9.2°C on the 16th /17th. The solar panel output, at 380kWh, was disappointing, but not untypical for August. So far, in September, temperatures have been generally rather autumnal, with a high of 23.2°C on the 6th and a chilly 3.2°C on the night of 12th /13th. **M.T.**

Countryside Notes October 2024

Tuesday 17 th September. I am writing this on the full Harvest Moon that shines bright tonight, with a partial eclipse forecast for between 2am and 3am. There has been very bright moonlight in the last few nights, with some days of bright sunshine which is starting the leaves on the trees to turn to their full autumnal glory, a time always to enjoy its spell-bound wonder. Today, we saw some old Beech trees with a heavy canopy of leaves, under which little growth is made due to light and moisture being taken up by the Beech trees.

However, round the base of the sturdy trunks, there are several different growths of Fungi making their appearance in differing colour and shapes that are appealing to look at and, if we had not been in traffic, I would have stopped the car to look more carefully and identify them (always a difficult task). Of course, this is the time to see the fruiting bodies of these fascinating forms of life that are so essential to all life. Penicillin is but one form of life that has saved many lives over many years. A walk in the woods on an organised Fungal Foray would be good to be a part of.

I mentioned our Merryweather Damsons last month and they were picked without a ladder or safety checks, as our squirrel population deemed them ready for picking before me and left only two fruit on the tree and the wasps were polishing them off! The squirrels had, back in July, taken the very few Pears that had set, however, they left the Walnuts on the tree much longer than usual. Now we see them scratching in the lawn burying things for winter use, if they can remember where they have buried them.

Our Apple trees have been very varied in cropping this year: a so-called Cox's has hardly an apple on it, when every year it has been bowed down with fruit that is not very useful; the Worcester Pearmain has little red early apples but very few have matured this year; whereas the Keswick, a yellow shined apple, that makes very early fluffy applesauce, has had a fine crop of larger than usual fruit; as has the Early Victoria, a tree that usually has small fruit with large ones out of reach at the top, which has yielded extremely well. The Villages Together Methodists are holding an Apple Fest on the 18 th October, which will embrace a hot meal of apple related food and drinks, where an expert on apples will speak about this wonderful, colourful fruit that has an interesting history and development of so many types of apple.

You are all invited to come and celebrate at the Stillington Village Hall. The naturalists are making a noise about the lack of Butterflies, which is of major concern, as the beautiful butterflies are the most noticeable of the insect populations that are a part of the life of our world in the work that they do in pollination and recycling of waste residue. I believe that the weather has played a major part in this decline. But, of course, agriculture is under pressure to reduce pesticides, all of which the Ministry has approved and promoted to enhance our crops. There is thinking to be done in this whole area to provide safe and adequate food for us all the world over, action with fewer words is a priority or we may find ourselves in the position of our insect populations.

Enough gloom, enjoy this autumn with its many colours and be glad to live in England. R & M
